#### From the Front Seat

Decades and decades ago, when I was a "young" man, I was a Ford guy. Ran in the family since my Dad handled the Ford account for a company called RL Polk. They did direct mailings for broad marketing campaigns. As luck would have it, my very first car was a 1954 Ford Customliner. I know I've written of this car in previous posts...I think when I was writing from the Back Seat! Before buying the Ford, I

drove the family's Renault Delphine. Both of these cars had manual transmissions, which in that day was not unusual.

My brother carried on the family tradition and went to work for the Mercury division of Ford. Of the many Mercurys I bought through him (and his connections), the ones I remember most were a Cougar XR-7 and a Capri (a really neat little car)...both were also manual transmissions. So early on, I had a lot of experience "rowing my own" gears.

My brother's job took him to Dallas, and I visited him fairly often since at the time I was footloose and un-attached. He had bought a new BMW 320i for his wife (working for Mercury?), had it for a couple of years, and was selling it. While I was not in the market for a car, I happened to be visiting during this time and he threw the keys to me and said "go ahead, take it for a drive".

Long story short...I drove it home. I was amazed that any manual transmission could shift so easily, or that any car could feel so light and nimble. Certainly, anyone who knows BMWs knows that the 320i is not known to be one of the best cars BMW ever built, but compared to all the (mostly) Ford products from that period that I'd been driving, it was remarkably agile.

Thus, I started my love affair with German automotive technology, and for a long period of time, BMWs in particular. I drove them as my daily drivers, and raced them in club racing for over 10 years. Then along came Porsche. I'd quit racing and reached the stage in my life where having a "toy" car (one not driven year-round or used as a daily driver) was doable. In a long-ago missive from the Back Seat I related the time when I bought my first Porsche...a 1988 911 Cabriolet...and how I ignored all the "danger" signals along the way and bought it anyway. I'm certainly glad I did.

As many of you know, I collect cars in a serial fashion. Since I have neither the resource nor storage capacity to own all the cars I've owned and loved at the same time, I do them one (or two) at a time...thus living within my limits and keeping peace

in the family. And along the way, I've learned that patience and bartering are wonderful things...having related in another previous post (this from the Front Seat) how my current and much loved 2009 911 Cabriolet is for me the "equivalent" of my wife's Koi Pond that now graces our back yard. At the risk of sounding sexist, I'll go ahead and say it..."happy wife, happy life!"! and Visa versa!

In the midst of my fascination for buying Porsches in serial fashion, along came Mr. Audi and Mr. Mercedes to do standin daily driver duty...all coming and going in serial fashion, the same as the Porsches, but also in keeping with my fascination/love of German cars. It needs to be said that since this fascination for German cars was born so many decades ago, the entire automotive industry has grown by leaps and bounds, with almost all manufacturers from countries around the world producing great products. From kid-haulers to haulassers, there are multiple choices for just about any type of automotive transport that anyone could want...including ones that drive themselves now. Really?!

But getting back to the German car theme here, I've recently noticed something knawing away at me as I occasionally browsed the auctions on Bring-a-Trailer. It took me a while to identify it, but it dawned on me that the cars on BaT that were capturing the bulk of my browsing time were BMWs... and the light bulb went off! OMG...how long has it been since I've owned and driven one of them? Well...wonder no more. Stay tuned...

On February 19th I traveled to Palm Springs, CA to meet my great friend Owen Balduf. Owen is a former RSR member who moved to California to pursue his rock violin career and to become a professional off road/adventure motorcycle guide for Rawhyde Adventures.

First, as some of you know, I am a car and motorcycle enthusiast. I love BMW and Harley motorcycles with many other classic and dirt bikes thrown in. Second, the term "adventure bikes" is defined as motorcycles that can be ridden on pavement and can easily go off road, through sand, over mountains and through rivers. My favorite motorcycle is a new 2023 BMW R1250GSA. An amazing motorcycle! Did I mention that Owen also is in sales for Long Beach BMW? Also convenient, as my new motorcycle was sitting in Owen's driveway.

most anything metal. Perfect for the hobbyist or DIYer. I bought a 3 foot stick of 1.75" x 0.095 wall DOM mild steel tube to make the proper size connecting sleeves for the roll cage. A little work with the bandsaw and the drill and viola, coupling sleeves, that fit. Paint, hardware, and some more additional work with the drill and we go from a pallet of parts to a ready to install cage.

Oddly enough the manufacturer provides the bolts and nuts to attach the cage to the floor but they don't provide any of the bolts or nuts for the sleeve connections. You get to source those yourself after of course reading the rule book to check what diameter and grade of bolt is required. In this case "it's always something" resulted in an unplanned trip to the fastener store. A bit more unplanned time and money spent on the project. It was kind of like the trip you have to make to the hardware store on a Sunday afternoon when you realize that your little baggie of spare faucet washers has every washer known to man except the one you need to fix the kitchen faucet.

What the roll cage seller does tell you up front is that the SCCA compliant double door bars do not simply bolt in like they used to. They have to be cut, fit, and welded into position after the cage is assembled. Not a trivial task and one yet to be completed for Project 944. It also takes the cage from being truly bolt in and removeable to partially bolt in and not removeable. This feature takes me from a simple "it's always something" to "I need a guy" who can fabricate in the side bars now that the cage is bolted into the car. Fortunately, I have a guy locally who vintage races a 914 so I think I have this covered without having to trailer the car to an offsite shop. Again, more time and more money, before the car is ready to go, time being the important factor here. I will also have to go back and cut and sleeve the side bars after they are welded in if I want to make them removeable. Time consuming but not difficult. Anyway, I think garage projects are always more fun and definitely more rewarding when there are some challenges to be overcome.

Likewise, "it's always something" can also lead to positive and rewarding outcomes. In my case, it usually leads to an opportunity (excuse) to buy new and interesting tools for the shop and garage. Come on, admit it, who among us works on cars or is a DIYer that doesn't like buying more tools? No one, of course. Especially power tools.

#### I Listen to Rush!

I was cleaning the garage the other day when my mind started wandering. I was thinking about the things that happen in life that make such an impression that they get frozen in your mind.

Once in the mid-1990's I was driving down Church Street in Brighton, approaching the intersection with Grand River. A big old Mercury Grand Marquis was just ahead of me, and the driver was wearing a hat.

Back then, nobody wore a hat unless they were way younger than me or way older. Driving a Marquis, this guy was older – probably even older than I am now.

Then I looked down and saw the bumper sticker that said, "I Listen to Rush!" Now, I had listened to Rush since 1975, and they were one of my favorite bands, along with Queen and Kansas. But I was surprised they were popular with people thirty or so years older than me!

Yeah, he meant a different Rush.

Back to the present, my mind kept wandering and I thought about all the deep-minded songs Rush played, with most of their lyrics written by Neil Peart. It would be hard to convince me that Neil was not the best drummer that has ever lived. (Unfortunately we lost him in 2020.)

The lyrics he wrote were just as extraordinary as his drumming. Most rock bands didn't cover the range of philosophy, dystopian societies, mythology, black holes, dealing with fame, the magical gift of radio, remembrances of growing up, and the imagined remembrances of a better past by someone living in future times.

That last subject is from their song Red Barchetta, which I didn't fully appreciate until a few years ago. It's about a society that had put in severe restrictions on cars and motors. Sports cars couldn't be driven anymore. What cars were left were huge – two lanes wide. But the song's protagonist has an uncle with a secluded hiding spot:

My uncle has a country place That no one knows about He says it used to be a farm Before the Motor Law

And there he hides a treasure from his youth, which he now keeps ready for the nephew:

A brilliant red Barchetta

From a better vanished time

With it the nephew commits his "weekly crime" of tearing along the country roads, driving like his uncle had:

Wind

In my hair Shifting and drifting Mechanical music Adrenaline surge

The music conveys those feelings. The title was based on Neil's favorite car, the 1948 Ferrari 166MM Barchetta, but most of us have similar memories with the cars from our youth. Many of them would look like toys next to today's cars.

It turns out the song was inspired by a 1973 article in Road & Track by Richard Foster. At the time there was a movement to make all new cars withstand a 50-mph collision without injuring the occupants. They would all have to be behemoths to do this. Foster imagined people driving them carelessly, and even making a sport of punting the older cars off the road. I remember reading about the same subject, and worrying that the fun would be sapped from driving.

Fifty years after that article, we have similar concerns. We can still find sports cars. Most are about 50% heavier than then, yet they perform better than ever. But "shifting and drifting" is becoming more rare, and in ten years it's possible that no new cars will have manual transmissions, and maybe no engines.

Big changes are coming, although it's hard to say exactly what. Heavy electrification and autonomous features, but to what extent? The safety movement nearly outlawed convertibles, and Cadillac advertised their 1976 Cadillac as "the last American convertible."

So who knows? Maybe the tide will turn. Again.





### **Ramblings From a Life With Cars**

#### **History of Style**


Porsche is celebrating 50 years of Porsche car design and marking it with a special edition run of Carrera 4S Targa cars plus a custom chronograph Porsche Design watch and a one off build of a new 1972 S Targa destined for the Porsche Museum, all cars presented in black with hounds tooth interior. The history of industrial design goes much further back. Industrial design also known as Werkbund is credited to Peter Behrens in 1907. Design style was applied to every day used household and industrial pieces. This opened the revelation that the style design of an item could add to its value beyond its functionality. In the US that industrial design was mostly credited to Raymond Loewy. He was born in France in 1893 and died in Monaco in 1986. He was credited with a wide variety of design of items from the Coke bottle to streamlined trains and many daily used kitchen utensils. He primarily worked for Studebaker with his most famous car design of the Avanti.

Porsche car design started with the 356 designed by Erwin Komenda in 1948 in Gmund, Austria with 76,000 cars in the production run through 1964. Design was relocated to Zuffenhausen in 1950. When Porsche decided to design a replacement they turned to Studebaker in 1953. Studebaker proposed a totally new design of front engine prototype they designated as the Porsche 542 or Studebaker design 7-87.

Porsche rejected this design and turned to Ferdinand Porsche to come up with a fresh design but with styling links to the 356. His design of the 911 became the original shape which even in its current shape can be recognized as descended from the earliest 356 design. He is also credited with the design of the 904 and the F1 racing car the 804. His other major contribution was adding the Targa bar for the 911 in answer to the government ban on convertible cars.

But Ferry wanted more design control so in 1972 he founded Porsche Design. In 2003 this became a subsidiary of Porsche AG combining with Porsche Design Group based in Zell Am See Austria. Separating from the family managed Porsche AG, Ferry was free to expand Porsche Design to a variety of project designs raging from consulting work with other major companies such as Bosch. Porsche Design Select covers such projects as men's and ladies fashion jackets, gloves, watches, luggage, and key fobs and so on. He has even designed a yacht. Porsche engineering has always provided engineering consultation to other manufacturers although on a very secretive basis.

Today Porsche car design is run by managing Director and chief designer Roland Heiler working from Design Studio F. A. Porsche. As is common in most manufacturers all of the car lines contain style elements that offer a common link between models and a shared design style thread that links all of the design generations.

In the case of my roll cage, I ran into difficulty trying to drill holes cross ways through the steel tubing I was using to make the sleeve connectors. I just could not fixture parts properly for consistent results. A little bit of internet searching, and some YouTube videos resulted in me picking this little honey up from the homebuilt aircraft guys.

Not only did it solve my problem, but I also found several more really cool tools from the same company that are now on my "have to have" radar just waiting for an excuse to buy, unlike my new drill press which required no such excuse. I'm not convinced that buying a new drill press for the pole barn/shop really qualified as an "it's always

something" necessity but I did it anyway, just in case. It's good to be prepared for the next challenge, I say.
