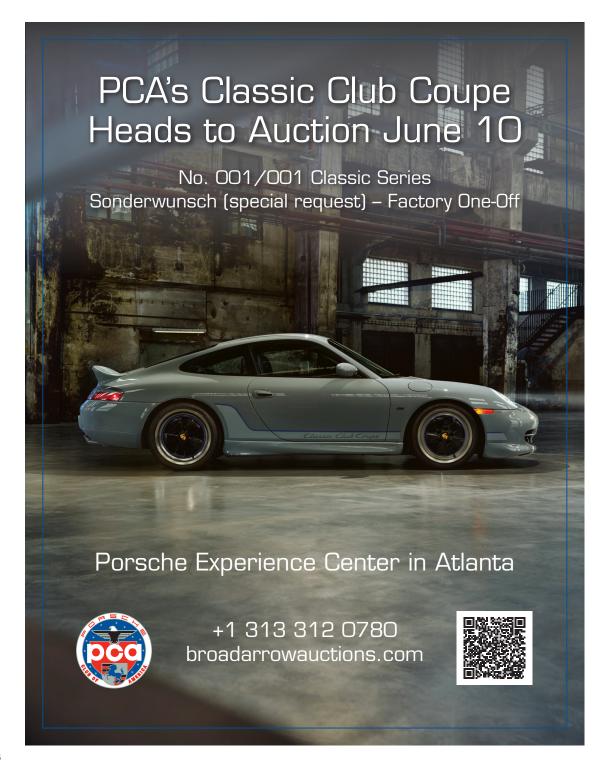

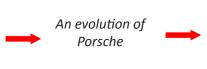

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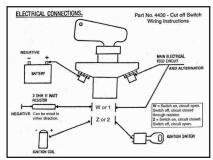
The 944 Chronicles

I dislike automotive wiring diagrams. Especially the ones I have a difficult time deciphering which is all of them. Several years ago, a young electrical engineer I worked with during my time in Afghanistan assured me that as a mechanical engineer it was OK if I let the smoke out of the wires occasionally when bread boarding a prototype wiring circuit idea. It was an indication that I had just learned something about electricity and electrical engineering. More succinctly, don't do that again. Consequently, adding auxiliary gauges to the 944 while challenging, only involved installing new gauges into existing gauge circuits. There wasn't a lot of deciphering required to understand what wire did what and where to plug them into the new gauges. No smoke emanated from my self-designed jumper harness, and ensuring a consistent ground was the biggest challenge.

However, one major racing-oriented modification to Project 944 remains. To me it is not only challenging but simultaneously fraught with peril. It is the wiring and installation of the mandatory external electrical cut-off switch. Typically mounted on the roll cage just inside either window (racing applications), it ensures that all power to the engine, alternator, and the rest of the vehicle (i.e., fuel pump and ignition) can be shut off externally by a corner or rescue worker. I already have a battery disconnect installed on the negative battery terminal but that won't meet the requirements of being able to kill the engine from outside the car in case of an emergency. An alternative mounting location for this switch on the 944 is under hood next to the stock battery location with an external pull cable attached to the switch. The other end of the pull cable provides a pull loop that is accessible externally along the base of the windshield.

I decided to use a Rennline 6 pole switch that isolates the battery feed, ignition coil, and ignition switch in a single quarter turn. It also includes a resistor circuit that prevents damage to the alternator if the switch is thrown while the engine is running. I know nothing about this particular feature but my longtime friends who are also automotive electrical engineers have promised me that failure to include said feature will almost assuredly result in an alternator replacement if the switch is flipped either accidentally or intentionally while the engine is running. I'll take their word for it.



Installation of course means modifying and adding to the factory wiring harness to accommodate both the switch circuitry and its installation location.



Hooking up a timing light to the MGB and setting ignition advance, easy. Setting points and checking dwell angle, ditto. Rerouting the primary power feeds and ignition coil wiring for the 944, I'm not quite there

yet. Inadvertently letting the smoke out of the wires is not an option for this project. I'm concerned about making an overly simplistic interpretation of the wiring diagram for the Rennline switch. Unfortunately, yet again, I have found myself overthinking this unfamiliar technical challenge and have gone into a state of analysis paralysis, a condition which really slows down progress until I manage to convince myself I know what to do.

Once I master the switch "challenge" the car is off to the fabricator to have the door bars installed into the roll cage. Notching and fitting tubes is definitely outside my current skill set. After that it's a matter of refitting the seats, belts, and roll bar padding. SCCA Improved Touring (IT) rules allow me to run the factory fuel tank along with a handheld fire extinguisher so the only work there is fabricating the fire bottle mounting plate to allow it to be mounted on the tunnel between the seats. A full remotely operated fire system installation is next up on the to do list for racing in vintage events with the VSCDA next year. In the meantime, according to the internet, I need to replace the "voltage stabilizer" for the fuel and temp gauges in the MGB. That is, once I figure out where it is and what it looks like.

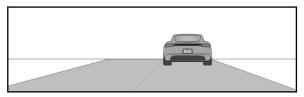
A Pleasant Surprise

On the way to our HPDE event at Grattan on MI-44 last year, I was following a car that caught my attention. It sure looked like a Porsche, but at about a quarter mile ahead, I couldn't quite place it. It had an impressively wide and low stance, and it was just a little squarish and blocky. Pretty intriguing.

I caught up closer to the track, and was very pleased to see it was a 718 Cayman, similar to the one I was driving! It's funny how you rarely get to see what your own car looks like on the road, but when you do it's good to find out that it looks great.

The other funny thing is that when the 718 came out, I wasn't thrilled with the styling cues. I didn't like the black band between the taillights with the chrome Porsche letters on it. I liked the way it was on my 987, where nothing connected the lights, and the vehicle model was spelled out in script. That was more subtle, and easily removed if you wanted to be more stealthy, which actually may be why Porsche puts more permanent lettering on the back now. (The badge on the frunk also used to be simply glued on, but now it sinks into an indent – you're not going to leave that off!)

And then there was the angularity of the 718. The contours had been very rounded on the 987. Now the shape was punctuated by sharp edges on the tops of the front and rear fenders. The headlights also had sharper ends. Hmmm.



On the other hand, designs have to change with time, or they get stale – even the 911 changes! For most cars, my rule of thumb is that if a new model looks good to me right away, it hasn't changed enough. The update has to create a reaction, show progress, and probably cause a little unease. Otherwise it won't age well. Music fans say the same thing when their favorite band's new album "just doesn't sound like the previous one." But who wants to hear the same thing again?

So, upon further review, the 718 works pretty well. The sharper edges help it break away from its big brother, without being too radical of a departure from previous Cay-

mans. And to me personally there is a hint of "pony car" in it, mainly from the early generations of Mustang (not a copy mind you, but similar elements).

Take a look at the 1970 Mustang rear window, a long fastback with a ducktail. The rear fenders extend wide from the B-pillars (or are they C-pillars?), and they are sharpedged, giving it broad shoulders. The 718 uses the same general concept. It looks great on both cars.

The 718 side scoops look awesome, just like on the 981. They remind me of those on the 1964 ½ to 1968 Mustangs, with one major difference: they're functional!

What do I miss about the 987 styling? The biggest thing is the extreme drop of the fastback, right down to the bumper. The rear fenders, sticking above the level of the window near the tail, give the impression it's going to leap ahead. The resulting ¾ view is stunning. No other car has that same squat look.

From a practical standpoint, I've never driven a car with better visibility than a 987, being able to see the ground 20 feet ahead and behind. The 718 is better than most modern cars, but it can't touch the 987, which also has huge mirrors placed forward and outward compared to the 718 (Porsche may have been trying to improve aerodynamics and wind noise by moving them back and in.)

Looking back, I don't know why I had a problem with the 718 in the first place. It must have had just the right amount of change.





Ramblings From a Life With Cars

What is Behind Me?

A long time feature on all cars is threatening to become extinct. We have taken for granted that all of our cars and trucks come equipped with rear view mirrors. The need to see what it behind us has not changed but how that is done has evolved in many of our current vehicles. It is shifting from that reflective piece of glass to a miniature camera and video screen. It is mostly a change of necessity but also of aero design. As automotive design has evolved in more wind cheating shapes the view out the rear of the car has become more and more restrictive and limited. The answer has turned from better window design to creative automotive technology. In some ways the same automobile racing demands that created the rear view mirror drove the technology of the replacement of mirrors by the video monitor and screen.

It is commonly held that the car mounted rear view mirror was created by Ray Harroun for the first Indy 500 of May 30, 1911. Rear view mirrors on street cars soon followed as the story goes. It was true that it was the first application of a mirror on a racing car. Ray Harroun actually was a widely successful racer and inventor of that era. Common racing practice was to carry a riding mechanic who would observe traffic as well as monitor the mechanical bits of the race car. Ray figured this created more aero drag as well as additional weight. He had never seen a mirror mounted on a car but he once had observed the driver of a horse drawn taxicab with a mirror mounted on a stick. His 3x8 mirror affixed to the dash of his Marmon Wasp drew much objection from the other racers.

But starting 28th in the first Indy 500 field he drove a steady race for 6 hours and 42 minutes to win at an average speed of 77 mph. In fact he credited his win to Firestone who advised him to keep the speeds below 80 to limit tire wear and blowouts. Changing a tire took over ten minutes and Ray only changed the right rear tire for the entire race where as his competitors changed as much as a dozen tires. As for the mirror advantage, "To tell the truth, on the track surface, I couldn't see a damn thing in it, Harroun said, and no one knew but me."

Harroun went on to drive for Buick and Marriot from 1905 to 1911winning many race with the 500 being his last race. He even founded the Harroun Motor Car Company in Wayne, Michigan before retiring in 1959 and dying in 1968. Riding mechanics became mandated in 1912 to 1917.

As for mirrors on street cars, European car the Arguns had a dash mounted mirror in 1906. In 1914 a patent was issued for a mirror mounting device to view blind spots and a book by Dorothy Levitt in 1906 advised women drivers to use a hand held compact mirror to occasionally look for traffic. In 1921 a patent was issued to Elmer Bergen for a device to mount a mirror he called The Cop Spotter. Mirrors were not widely used because most roads were only two lanes. But as roads were widened to four lanes and traffic increased, the need for mirrors grew. Still, through the early 80's only an inside mirror and a left side mirror were required. My 1972 911 might be one of the last Porsches with only a left side door mirror.

Similar to Ray Harrouns racing mirror, aero considerations are driving the trends to the modern video camera replacing mirrors. The fact is that modern rear windows have become ridiculously small with very limited rear vision. The rear view camera on rear deck lids is very nearly standard equipment but even outside mirrors may shrink to postage stamp size. One tap of the windshield mounted mirror can change it to a wide angle camera view even with enhanced brightness. The days of the mirror being blocked by tall passengers or boxed cargo are gone. Racing has also kept pace with camera technology. Chevrolet developed an advanced rear camera system for its racing Corvettes. Especially in night races it was difficult to keep track of upcoming cars with the glare of headlights. The GM system sorts out cars coming up to pass and even identifies what class of car it is and which side of the car being passed it is most likely to take. GM has made the technology free to all competitors and has saved countless accidents. Along with blind spot monitor lights in the side view mirrors we have taken rear view mirrors into the current century.

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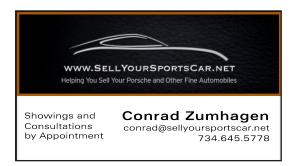

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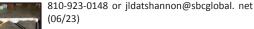

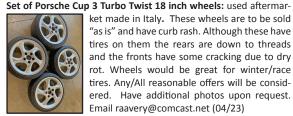
