

MotorStadt Region's biggest family, fun-filled weekend is just around the corner. Yep, May 5 and 6 provide the opportunity to start your Porsche driving season off with a BANG! Two diverse days filled with opportunities to renew acquaintances, make new ones, learn new skills, enjoy good food/fellowship and most of all smile.

Saturday, May 5th provides the unique opportunity to test your driving skills and develop new ones at the MSR Autocross School. What's so unique? This event is held on Spartan Speedway's banked racetrack in Mason, Michigan. Using the oval and the infield "X" track combination, participants experience the chance to legally and safely fine-tune their driving skills. A little reluctant to give it a try? Well, experienced instructors are on hand to demonstrate and provide first hand guidance to "first timers". Experienced drivers have the opportunity to dust the cobwebs out of their techniques and cars. You ask, does it really only cost one thin dime to play and how do I get there? No, the cost is actually one thin \$20 bill per driver and you get there from Lansing by driving south on US 127, taking the Cedar Street/Mason exit and turning right on Cedar Street at the end of the exit ramp. The track is about a half mile northwest on the left side of the street at the corner of Cedar Street and College Road. Turn left at the traffic light at the Cedar/College intersection and right into the track area about 1 block down College. Event chairmen Dave Johnson and Terrill Whitney advise that the track will be open at 8:00 AM with Tech Inspections starting at 8:30 AM, novice driving starting at 10:00 AM and experienced drivers on the track at approximately 11:00 AM.

The second half of the weekend activity is on Sunday, May 6. It's the annual MSR "Spring Kick-Off and White Elephant Auction". This isn't really an event; it is more like a "Happening". GET TECHNICAL

by Paul D. Young, Sr., San Diego Region (from THE WINDBLOWN WITNESS)

This is the first in a series of articles on performance driving. Performance driving means, of course, Porsche driving. These articles focus on the mental aspects of driving, rather than on driving technique itself. The material will be useful whether or not you drive at track events and no matter what kind of car you are driving. You will find many easy-to-use hints and tips here and, most importantly, you will gain the means to improve your driving at any level and for the rest of your life!

This chapter introduces the concepts of the driver's mind as part of the car. Later, we will deal with specific topics as they relate to improving this part. Subjects will include preparation, attitude, practicing, seeing, and learning, among others.

There are a number of good books on the basics of performance driving and some of these do go into the realm of the brain as part of the driving equation. There are also many excellent driving schools you can attend around the nation that will help you with your driving on or off the track. Our own PCASD Driving School is an excellent value, plus it is close, convenient, and lets you drive your own Porsche. Each autocross, slalom, or time trial our club offers has the emphasis on education with experienced instructors to help you learn. In these articles, we will discuss driving technique from time to time, and will probably cover most of everything you need to review. However, the emphasis is on developing the cognitive skills that support and enhance the technique and give you a definite competitive edge and safety margin.

The first PCA event in which I participated was a navigational rally. I definitely took a liking to the cerebral aspects of this competition. The challenge was to interpret the instructions correctly and stay on course. Soon thereafter, the autocross/slalom bug hit. I found that these track events were physical as opposed to the mental exercise of rallying. Or so I thought. More and more I am learning how important the mind is in performance driving, and that it is the key element to improving driving skills.

Before we get much further, we need to agree that it is worthwhile to work on improving the driver's mind. First, there should be no question that the driver is the most significant variable in the driving equation. Yes, I

CORNERS OF things you can do to faster. Yes, I know that soft compound tires, for example, make a big difference. But I have

also seen many instances of notably good drivers being upstaged by even better drivers in their own car. Very conclusive proof of the difference drivers make can be found in the results of the Michelin Challenge at the 1992 Porsche Parade here in San Diego. At this event, a box-stock 968 was equipped with Michelin XGTs and Parade entrants were allowed to drive it around the Grand-Prix course: a sort of mini-autocross in the Stadium's Southeast lot. Margie Smith-Haas was way out in front, with the rest of us fairly evenly strung out through a wide range of lap times. You might argue that some drivers had an advantage over others if they were more familiar with the 968. It doesn't matter. Either way, the driver is still the most important factor and is the most significant difference in lap times.

Secondly, do we really need to go through all this mind game stuff to turn fast laps? Well, if you accept that the driver is the most important part of the car, what's the most important part of the driver? No, not the stomach... no, not that either! It's the mind, of course. I have not performed experiments to remove a driver's brain and see if lap times get worse (although at times I have felt like I forgot mine). But, no matter how physical driving events may seem, there is a lot of thought that goes into operating a car at speed. Granted, one needs to be physically fit to compete in a time trial where the effort of 30 minute run groups and heat can be exhausting. And, I will be the first to say that race drivers are indeed athletes, with pulse rates of 150+ for hours at a time. It's just difficult to imagine being fast without concentrating and focusing on what you're doing. Even

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
